We also continued our efforts in ongoing crises in Syria, Yemen, and Somalia, intensifying our support for displaced persons and refugees in Turkey, Lebanon, Jordan, and beyond. Last year saw a significant expansion in Qatar Charity's reach and impact, as we were able to assist more vulnerable communities and provide essential support to those affected by conflict and disaster. In addition to our emergency response, we implemented recovery programs and sustainable solutions that empower individuals and communities to rebuild their lives.

Our commitment to collaboration partnership was also a key highlight of 2023. We signed several strategic agreements and memoranda of understanding to strengthen coordination with trusted global partners. These included partnerships with the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) for health, water, and sanitation projects in Yemen, and agreements with the International Organization for Migration (IOM), the International Rescue Committee (IRC), and the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), among others. We also continued our close cooperation with the Qatar Fund for Development to enhance the efficiency and coordination of humanitarian efforts worldwide.

As we mark four decades of charitable work, I would like to extend my heartfelt gratitude to His Highness Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad bin Khalifa Al Thani, Amir of Qatar, and His Highness the Father Amir, Sheikh Hamad bin Khalifa Al Thani. Also, I must express my deepest appreciation, on behalf of Qatar Charity and all those working with us, to our generous donors, whose unwavering support has been the cornerstone of our achievements, and to our volunteers, whose dedication and noble spirit continue to shape a brighter future for all. We ask Allah to grant us and you success, guidance, and righteousness, to illuminate our path, and to guide us towards that which pleases Him.

Message from the CEO

The year 2023 presented exceptional challenges for the world, and particularly for our region, as humanitarian crises reached unprecedented levels. Conflicts and natural disasters drove these crises to their highest point in a decade, with over 340 million people in urgent need of humanitarian assistance. A significant portion of those affected reside in countries such as Afghanistan, Syria, Sudan, Yemen, Somalia, and Palestine, where the basic necessities for protection and dignity are gravely lacking.

In the face of such extensive human suffering, compounded by the global food crisis that has left more than 230 million people facing severe hunger, the resources available within the international humanitarian system were insufficient to meet growing needs. Nevertheless, Qatar Charity remained at the forefront of humanitarian response, extending aid to those most affected, despite mounting challenges in reaching vulnerable populations.

At the beginning of the year, we responded swiftly to the Kahramanmara earthquake, which struck southern Turkey and northern Syria. Qatar Charity was among the first humanitarian organizations on the ground, providing urgent shelter, nutrition, and essential items to approximately 1.8 million people in the affected areas. Our commitment extended to long-term recovery, in partnership with the Turkish government, to support the reconstruction of educational and

healthcare institutions, along with other vital infrastructure destroyed by the earthquake. In Sudan, where over 25 million people require humanitarian assistance and 800,000 stand on the brink of famine amid one of the world's most critical crises, Qatar Charity swiftly responded to the displacement crisis. Despite unprecedented access challenges, we provided urgent food, healthcare, water and sanitation, shelter, child care, and livelihood assistance to more than 444,000 affected individuals, including internally displaced persons and refugees in neighboring countries.

In Somalia, where a severe food crisis has been exacerbated by prolonged drought and climate change, nearly 7 million people are facing extreme food insecurity. Qatar Charity's aid reached over 1.2 million individuals, providing food assistance to 738,000 people. Additionally, Qatar Charity played an active role in the urgent humanitarian response to the Al-Haouz earthquake in Morocco, which affected 300,000 people, and the Derna floods in Libya, impacting more than 800,000 individuals. We successfully delivered critical, life-saving aid to over 100,000 people in both countries.

As the last quarter of the year began, the tragic war on Gaza erupted, leaving the world stunned by the sheer scale of destruction and human suffering. Over two million people, meaning the entire population of Gaza, half of whom are children, are in desperate need

of urgent humanitarian aid and protection. From the onset of this humanitarian crisis, Qatar Charity, in close collaboration with local partners, the United Nations, and international humanitarian organizations, swiftly initiated life-saving assistance in the areas of food, water, medicine, and shelter, despite the immense challenges faced by all humanitarian agencies in accessing the Strip. The image of aid convoys stalled at the Rafah crossing, unable to enter Gaza, remains a stark reminder of the dire situation, with hundreds of thousands still waiting for aid. Despite these obstacles, we remain resolute in our commitment to stand with the people of Gaza and advocate for their fundamental right to a life of dignity. We will continue our unwavering support, using all available means, to ensure that humanitarian efforts persist and sufficient aid reaches those in need.

We also continued to implement our development and humanitarian programs across 60 countries, reaching over 10 million beneficiaries worldwide with an intervention volume exceeding \$328 million. Our support encompassed aid for Rohingya refugees and Syrian displaced persons and refugees both within Syria and in neighboring countries. Through our offices and local partners, we executed a wide array of impactful projects and initiatives. Notable accomplishments include the establishment of several schools for orphans in Bangladesh, the provision of prosthetic limbs for individuals with disabilities in Pakistan, the creation of the "Ebsar" camp to battle blindness in Tanzania, and the distribution of school supplies to orphans in Sudan.

Additionally, we laid the foundation for the City of Dignity in northern Syria, a residential complex designed to include 1,680 housing units along with essential facilities and

infrastructure. Our successful initiatives and campaigns included "Ramadan: Leave Your Mark", the "Merciful Hearts" campaign, the "50,000 Lives" campaign, the "Man Ahyaha" (Who revived it) campaign, and the "AlAqraboon" initiative. The "Rofaqaa" program for child care also expanded, reaching 200,000 sponsored orphans.

Furthermore, we continued to enhance the effectiveness and efficiency of delivering humanitarian and development aid, expanding the geographical reach of our field offices. We remain committed to localizing aid by strengthening the implementation of programs through local partners, as this approach ensures the most efficient and effective delivery of assistance to those in need.

As we present the 2023 Annual Impact Report, which highlights our global activities and programs, I would like to extend my heartfelt gratitude to all our donors for their unwavering support and trust, to our partners, local actors around the world, volunteers, and everyone who contributes to the success of our humanitarian initiatives and creates a lasting impact on the lives of those in need.

The achievements of Qatar Charity would not have been possible without the grace and guidance of Allah, and the spirit of solidarity and generosity within the Qatari community. Your commitment to our mission fortifies our resolve to continue our efforts and strive for greater impact, with the goal of ensuring a dignified life for all.

A group of Qatari philanthropists came together to form a community initiative called "The Committee of Qatar for Orphan Sponsorship" to support orphaned children in neighbouring countries.

The initiative is officially established as an NGO under the name "Qatar Charity", expanding its activities and outreach to support relief and development assistance.

Qatar Charity launches the "Rofaqa" Initiative to provide comprehensive services for orphaned children and youth. With field offices in 33 countries and implementing partners in 40 others, Qatar Charity is at the forefront of global response serving millions across the world.

Today, Qatar Charity has significantly expanded its reach and impact, empowering individuals and communities to rebuild their lives. Their humanitarian interventions have affected nearly ten million people across more than 55 countries.

We work closely with communities impacted by natural disasters and conflicts, ensuring an accurate assessment of their needs and delivering tailored humanitarian and development solutions. Our local presence allows us to engage directly with beneficiaries, ensuring their involvement in assessing needs and shaping the appropriate response. This proximity also enhances the effectiveness and timeliness of our interventions, while amplifying the voices of those affected within the international community, ensuring a coordinated and comprehensive response.

Qatar Charity identifies countries based on objective and transparent criteria, including the extent of needs, access to beneficiaries, opportunities for partnership and cooperation across sectors, cooperation with the government, and the legislative environment for NGOs.

- 6. Participation and active involvement of beneficiaries in all aspects of response, from planning and programming to implementation and evaluation.
- 7. Managing the initiative in its various stages, from determining the need, to monitoring and evaluation through design, implementation, and follow-up.
- 8. Responding to the humanitarian needs articulated by the UN Humanitarian Response Plans.
- 9. Addressing the protection and humanitarian development needs of refugees articulated by the urgent humanitarian response plans.

The network's pool fund is collectively owned and managed by its members. In 2023, Qatar Charity has received fund of \$500,000 for relief projects in Nepal, Yemen and Somalia.

As a member, Qatar Charity focuses a portion of its publications and information activities on the work of the United Nations and helps expand its outreach.





GOVERNANCE

External Regulation

Regulatory Authority for Charitable Activities

Qatar Charity operates under the supervision of the State of Qatar's Regulatory Authority for Charitable Activities (RACA). RACA provides the legal and regulatory framework for the establishment and management of charities in the country, which is aligned with the guidelines of leading international charity regulators.

External Audit

Qatar Charity undergoes an annual external audit conducted by Mazars Group. The audit takes place in headquarters and across all field offices by local external auditors accredited in those countries. Mazars also conducts audits to ensure Qatar Charity's compliance with anti-money laundering (AML) and counter-terrorist financing (CTF) regulatory requirements.

Internal Regulation

Policies and Procedures

Qatar Charity's external and internal work is underpinned by a set of 60 policies and 140 procedures approved by the board of directors that provide guidance for all its operations.

Board of Directors

The board oversees independent and specialized committees in risk management, compliance and audit, which have clear roles and responsibilities in line with RACA's regulatory instructions and Qatar Charity's internal regulations. The board also undergoes an annual self-evaluation process as stipulated by its self-evaluation, self-compensation and conflict of interest policies.

Risk Management

Risk management is an essential part of Qatar Charity's governance system, having adopted a risk-based approach in all aspects of its work by using advanced tools to manage any existing and emerging risks. Qatar Charity worked on developing a risk management system tailored to the high-risk work of NGOs, which allows us to identify, anticipate, and mitigate risks before, during, and after the delivery of humanitarian and developmental aid.

Country Risk Assessment Tool

Qatar Charity developed a country assessment tool to evaluate the risks associated with working in more than 70 countries based on five main indicators:

- 1. Transparency International's corruption perception index
- 2. The Financial Action Task Force (FATF) classification
- 3. The Fund for Peace's Fragile States Index
- 4. The Institute for Economics and Peace's Global Terrorism Index

Risk Mitigation Systems

Qatar Charity recognizes the potential risks associated with the misuse of NGO funds. To mitigate these risks, the organization implements rigorous control procedures, which include establishing robust fundraising practices, verification processes to ensure proper use of funds, stringent financial management across its external offices, and advanced procedures in delivering aid. Additionally, Qatar Charity employs advanced tools for conducting due diligence proportionate to the risk levels of all entities associated with the organization. This includes leveraging high-tech solutions provided by leading companies such as Refinitiv. Through this system, all stakeholders partners, donors, and beneficiaries are screened against various sanctions lists, including the UN Security Council's consolidated list, the EU and Qatar sanctions lists, the US Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) list, and the sanctions lists of relevant beneficiary countries.

Internal Audit

One of the main objectives of the audit is to enhance internal control through a specialized committee, department and policy. A quarterly internal audit report is submitted to the board to ensure transparency and facilitate oversight.

Financial Reporting

Qatar Charity is committed to being open and transparent about where its funds come from and how it is allocated. All financial reports are available to the public on Qatar Charity's website.

Qatar Charity's humanitarian interventions throughout 2023 focused on delivering rapid, appropriate, and coordinated responses to the most critical crises. Our efforts aimed to alleviate the suffering of displaced persons, refugees, and those affected by humanitarian emergencies, while contributing to the fulfillment of their basic rights.

In 2023, Qatar Charity reached 5.5 million beneficiaries with lifesaving interventions in 33 countries

In February 2023, a powerful earthquake struck Turkey and Syria, resulting in a high number of casualties and displacing thousands of individuals. Qatar Charity swiftly mobilized relief efforts to provide essential aid to affected populations and those grappling with the aftermath of the disaster in close coordination with relevant parties.

From the earliest hours following the earthquake, Qatar Charity's field teams swiftly mobilized to distribute urgent relief aid to the victims. Simultaneously, an emergency relief campaign titled "Save Earthquake Victims in Turkey and Syria" was launched, aimed at alleviating the suffering of affected communities and contributing to the recovery efforts.



Syria

Beneficiaries: 20,000

Qatar Charity Offers Food Assistance to Internally Displaced Syrians (IDPs)

To enhance food security among IDPs, Qatar Charity set up a bread production line in Sarmada, a village in northern Syria, to support the distribution of free bread to 20,000 IDPs daily living across six displacement camps including, Babiska, Barisha, and Sarmada for four consecutive months. The production line is designed to offer employment for 20 individuals. It operates at a capacity of 3.2 tons of flour per day, resulting in 3,820 bundles of bread daily. Its maximum production capability reaches approximately 10 tons per day.

Seasonal Food Assistance Project in Kenya

Qatar Charity provided seasonal food assistance to over 10,500 families in Kenya, contributing to enhanced food security for vulnerable groups facing the risks of worsening food insecurity.

Bangladesh

Thousands of Rohingya Refugees Receive Essential Eyecare

Qatar Charity and Orbis, continue to collaborate to provide essential eye care treatment to Rohing-ya refugees and the local host population in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh. In one year, more than 75,000 eye examinations have been conducted, accompanied by over 18,000 surgeries performed, prescriptions for glasses issued, and medicines dispensed.

The two-year program, funded by Qatar Charity, is strengthening the eye health network by facilitating training for over 300 individuals, ranging from frontline health workers to doctors and nurses. Currently, more than 130 individuals have received essential training.

Tanzania

Beneficiaries: 2,360

Ibsar Camp for Blindness Prevention in Tanzania

Qatar Charity organized the 'Ibsar Camp for Combating Blindness' in Tanzania with the aim of mitigating preventable visual impairment. Over the course of 10 days, the medical camp catered to 2,360 individuals, offering a range of services such as eye examinations, treatments, cataract surgeries, and the provision of eyeglasses. Additionally, the initiative included awareness-raising campaigns and training workshops to further empower the local community.

Rohingya

Beneficiaries: 25,000

Providing Health Services to Rohingya Refugees

Throughout 2023, Qatar Charity continued the provision of free medical services to thousands of Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh, through the health center it has set up at Rohingya Camp No. 21 in Teknaf in Cox's Bazar. The number of beneficiaries during the past year surpassed 25,000 refugees.

Pakistan

Beneficiaries: 20,000

Setting Up a Healthcare Facility in Pakistan

Qatar Charity has set up a rural health center (RCH) in the Jhang District of Punjab province, Pakistan. This center is designed to enhance and elevate healthcare services for the district's population.

The upgraded facility includes doctors' offices, a dental clinic, a pharmacy, a laboratory, a labor room, a nursing area, an emergency room, an X-ray room, and a specialized section dedicated to maternal and child healthcare. It is expected to positively impact 20,000 residents in the targeted rural areas.

Somalia

Recently Established Health Center in Somalia

Qatar Charity laid the foundation stone for a health center in the city of Bartiri in the state of Jubaland, Somalia, in the presence of the Minister of Interior of the State of Jubaland. The center is expected to provide integrated health services, benefiting 20,000 people from the city and neighboring areas that suffer from the lack of basic services. The health center includes a reproductive health department, an emergency department, doctors' rooms, a health education room, a midwife's room, a medical statistics room, a laboratory, a vaccination room, and a pharmacy.

Ghana

Beneficiaries: 20,000

Establishing Healthcare Clinics in Rural Ghana

In 2023, Qatar Charity opened two new health centers in the cities of Tamale and Savlgo in Northern Ghana providing various medical services to the community.

Pakistan

Beneficiaries: 500

Free Health Camp in Pakistan

Qatar Charity organized a free health camp in the Sanghar district of Pakistan, aimed to heighten awareness regarding acute malnutrition among children. Medical services were also provided to children and their mothers, such as medical tests for diabetes, blood pressure, HIV, hepatitis B & C, and pregnancy.

Bangladesh

Fifteen Schools Catering to Orphaned Children in Bangladesh

Qatar Charity commenced the construction of 15 schools in Bangladesh for orphans. The schools which are set to host nearly 3,500 students, will include academic and residential facilities, classrooms, dormitories, and activity halls.

Pakistan

Beneficiaries: 1,500

New Classrooms in Punjab and Sindh

Modern model classrooms were built in public schools located in the Punjab and Sindh provinces of Pakistan. These classrooms were furnished and equipped with bathrooms featuring hand-washing facilities. Additionally, water tanks were installed to ensure students had access to clean drinking water.

Bangladesh

Beneficiaries: 1,000

Four New Schools in Bangladesh

Qatar Charity commenced the construction of four new schools in Gaibandha, Gopalganj, Meherpur, and Bogra, all districts in Bangladesh, to benefit more than 1,000 children. The schools are part of Qatar Charity's ongoing efforts to build and equip more schools to improve education access to students from marginalized communities. These schools will provide a supportive learning environment for orphaned children, as well as those belonging to disadvantaged families to ensure they continue their education.

Multiple Countries

Beneficiaries: 7,000

Empowering Teachers

In 2023, Qatar Charity extended vocational training and skills development programs to over 7,000 teachers across regions including Somalia, Palestine, Mauritania, northern Syria, and elsewhere. The support included the provision of monthly financial rewards that contribute to supporting them in carrying out their educational duty.

Nepal

Beneficiaries: 160

A New School in Nepal

Qatar Charity constructed and furnished a building for the Shree Janata Secondary School in the Rampurkhap village under the Paroha municipality of Nepal. The intervention included the distribution of school supplies to orphans in Kathmandu, the capital of Nepal.

WASH Services in Bangladesh

To ensure the provision of essential healthy services in rural areas, Qatar Charity constructed 508 water wells and equipped them with toilets in key locations across Bangladesh, benefiting over 104,179 rural citizens.

Pakistan

Beneficiaries: 177,761

Clean and Safe Drinking Water in Pakistan

Qatar Charity has constructed 1,482 hand pump wells in remote areas of Pakistan to provide clean water and sanitation services. These projects were implemented in the Peshawar and Nowshera districts of the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province, where residents face severe challenges in accessing potable water. This intervention supported approximately 25,000 families, with some beneficiaries also participating in awareness campaigns focused on personal hygiene and disease prevention.

Syria

Rehabilitation of the New Bablit Water Station in Northern Syria

Qatar Charity has rehabilitated and operated the Bablit water station in northern Syria. The efforts also included the rehabilitation of all its main and subsidiary irrigation channels. This station provides irrigation water to approximately 5,000 hectares of cultivated land in the region.

Sudan

Beneficiaries: 19,000

Safe Drinking Water for Internally Displaced Persons in Sudan

To ensure the provision of clean drinking water and sanitation facilities to internally displaced persons (IDPs) living in the shelter centers in Port Sudan, Qatar Charity reached 1,200 families and distributed 1,200 water collection and storage equipment. The efforts also included WASH campaigns in the shelter centers, the provision of hygiene materials and supplies, as well as the maintenance of sewage facilities in some of the areas within the shelter centers.

Pakistan

Beneficiaries: 3,000

Solar-Powered Water Projects in Pakistan

Three solar-powered water pumps and ten hand pumps were installed in the Sinjar area, which is grappling with drought and water scarcity. These installations will benefit more than 3,000 people by providing them with access to clean and reliable water sources.

Pakistan

Beneficiaries: 55,000

Clean Water and Hygiene Projects in Flood-Affected Districts in Pakistan

Qatar Charity, in partnership with UNICEF, provided essential clean water and hygiene services in Rajanpur, Punjab. The initiatives included the installation of 25 solar-powered water pumps, the construction of 10 water ponds, and the installation of toilets for approximately 500 families. These efforts benefited over 55,000 individuals impacted by the severe floods that affected Pakistan in 2022.

Pakistan

Beneficiaries: 170,000

Climate-Resilient Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) Emergency Response to Floods in Balochistan, Pakistan

In collaboration with UNICEF, Qatar Charity focused on restoring water, sanitation, and hygiene services in three districts of Naseerabad, Balochistan. The project involved renovating climate-resilient WASH facilities and ensuring their maintenance and sustainability. This response provided crucial support to more than 170,000 people affected by the floods.

Enhancing Food Security in Somalia Through Agricultural Projects

Qatar Charity provided agricultural equipment, seeds, and tools to support 150 farmers to secure their harvests in the rainy season in the governorates of Galgdud and Bay, reaching 6,000 people.

'Al Karama' City in Northern Syria

Qatar Charity laid the foundation stone for the 'Al Karama' city near the Al-Bab city in northern Aleppo's countryside. The city is expected to serve as a safe and model housing complex for approximately 8,500 internally displaced Syrians.

Pakistan

Beneficiaries: 50

New Orphanage in Pakistan

Qatar Charity recently launched an orphan hostel in Tando Muhammad Khan, a remote rural region in Pakistan's Sindh province, aimed at offering a secure environment for orphaned children to reside and pursue their education. This orphanage, established in collaboration with Pakistan Bait Ul Mal, safely accommodates up to 50 children.

Bangladesh

Beneficiaries: 2,200

326 Homes for Rohingya Refugees

Qatar Charity has initiated the reconstruction of 326 homes for Rohingya refugees in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh, specifically in the Balukhali camp. These homes were tragically destroyed by a fire that swept through the refugee camp in March. Working in collaboration with the Office of Refugee Affairs, Relief, and Return of the Government of Bangladesh, the reconstruction efforts have commenced to provide shelter and support to those affected by the disaster.

Bangladesh

Beneficiaries: 800

Four Orphanages with Schools in Bangladesh

Qatar Charity opened four orphanages in Bangladesh, including schools to support orphaned children in their education. The orphanages are designed to accommodate 800 orphaned children. Spread across three distinct regions of Bangladesh—Gazipur, Meherpur, and Brahmanbaria—the orphanages include classrooms, residential sections, a kitchen, a dining hall, teachers' rooms, and restroom facilities.



Improving The Wellbeing of Children in Need

In 2023, Qatar Charity sponsored 203,447 children across 38 countries, providing them with regular assistance through a total budget of \$110 million.

By the end of 2023, the number of qualitative projects and multi-service centers for orphans, children and their families reached 303.

Qatar Charity's "Rofaqaa" initiative is a sponsorship program that focuses on improving the well-being of the most vulnerable children. Through this program, we strive to address the root cause of children's vulnerability by providing children and their families with essential services, equipping them with vital life and job skills to improve their socio-economic well-being, and empowering them to break the cycle of poverty.

Inception

- Since its inception, Qatar Charity has been dedicated to child sponsorship and has worked to enhance welfare systems in the countries where we operate.
- Initially established as a community-led initiative to sponsor children orphaned by conflicts and disasters in countries neighboring Qatar, Qatar Charity has since expanded into various other fields. Despite this growth, childcare remains a pivotal sector of Qatar Charity's aid work.
- During the years 2003-2023, the number of children sponsored by Qatar Charity has reached 532,220 across 59 countries.
- We aim to enhance the living conditions of families with sponsored children by providing opportunities for them to engage in income-generating projects. Since 2006, Qatar Charity has facilitated 45,336 such projects for these families.



Support Provided

- Monthly financial support throughout the sponsorship period.
- Community projects encompassing education, health, sports, and entertainment, including lectures, and training workshops.
- Economic empowerment initiatives for widows, mothers, and children transitioning out of sponsorship.
- University sponsorship by covering tuition fees.
- Intermittent assistance to cover expenses like laptops, eyewear, bicycles, or for psychological support and household repairs.

Integrated Care for Children

We strive to ensure that the children we sponsor receive integrated care, including health, education, and cultural support. We also work to develop their skills and capabilities to enable them to be active members of their communities.

Sponsored orphans on Umrah trips, Number of beneficiaries: **126**

Qatar Charity sponsored a total of 126 orphans, along with their mothers, to perform Umrah. The Umrah trips are part of Qatar Charity's continuous efforts to provide comprehensive care to the children sponsored under the "Rofaqaa" initiative.

"LEAVE YOUR MARK" RAMADAN CAMPAIGN



The "Leave your Mark" Campaign 2023 was implemented in 41 countries, distributing over 1,200,000 food baskets and ready-to-eat meals. The campaign also included healthcare services and clean water provisions. Additionally, 5,944 children were sponsored, and 1,342 decent homes were provided.

Qatar Charity introduced the "Alquloob Alrahima" initiative, also known as "Compassionate Hearts," which addressed congenital heart defects in children across Senegal, Somalia, Bangladesh, Ghana, and Pakistan through cardiac catheterization, eliminating the necessity for open heart surgeries.

Qatar Charity launched the '50,000 Lives' campaign aimed at providing treatment to 50,000 individuals with eye conditions. The campaign centered on the organization of medical camps to carry out medical examinations, cataract surgeries, and operations for children, as well as ensuring they received necessary medicines and treatments.



Number of beneficiaries: 50,000



Qatar Charity has launched the "Ibsar" campaign which aims to combat preventable blindness through the provision of eye treatment. The program targets visually impaired and blind adults and children in multiple countries including Bangladesh, Tanzania, Côte d'Ivoire, Ghana, Nigeria, Burkina Faso, Somalia and Mali. In 2023, the program has treated more than 19,500 children, allowing them to return to school, and enabling adults to regain their normal lives after surgery.

Qatar Charity launched the "Making a Smile" initiative, also known as, "Sinaat Allbtisamah" to help treat children with cleft lips. The program runs in five countries including Ghana, Somalia, Pakistan, Tanzania, and Nigeria.

Qatar Charity initiated the "Man Ahyaha" campaign to aid children under five years old afflicted by severe and acute malnutrition in Somalia and Pakistan. The campaign included providing nutritional support, conducting medical assessments, and delivering life-saving therapeutic nutrition services.

Qatar Charity's initiative to provide support and care for patients suffering from non-communicable (chronic) diseases. These diseases encompass four main categories: cardiovascular diseases (such as heart attacks and strokes), cancer, chronic respiratory diseases (such as chronic obstructive pulmonary disease and asthma), and diabetes.

The initiative implemented seven projects in four countries: Somalia, Ivory Coast, Pakistan, and Ghana, benefiting 2,500 patients.

Qatar Charity launched the 2023-2024 winter campaign titled "One Heart", aiming to reach approximately 1.5 million people in 21 countries, including Qatar, at an estimated cost of around \$ 16 million.

The campaign focuses on Palestine due to the current challenging humanitarian conditions in the Gaza Strip, which have further worsened with the onset of winter. It also targets Syria, Sudan, Jordan, Bosnia, Somalia, Yemen, Afghanistan, Albania, Pakistan, Rohingya refugees, Bangladesh, Turkey, Central African Republic, Chad, Tunisia, Kyrgyzstan, Kosovo, Lebanon, Morocco and Qatar.


Qatar Charity is grateful to all its heroes on the ground, risking their lives to support those in need and delivering critical aid during disasters, conflicts, and other crises.

Light Restored: Jamal's Journey

Jamal, a young boy from rural Kumasi, Ghana, helped his family herd cattle until an accident left him blind. Despite their limited resources, his family never lost hope. His father sought medical help, but the costs were beyond their means, shattering their dreams of restoring Jamal's sight. Jamal said, "Losing vision in both eyes is a challenging experience, especially if you knew the meaning of sight before. I have learned to imagine the world with my other senses, but it saddens me to think that I might spend my entire life this way."

Unable to afford treatment, Jamal was sent to a school for the blind in Wa, far from home, where he struggled to adapt for five long years. Hope came through Qatar Charity's "Ibsar" initiative, which funded the surgery Jamal needed. After the operation, Jamal's vision began to return, filling his life with renewed hope.

"I hope you accept my heartfelt thanks. I can smile a little now, and I believe brighter days are awaiting me and many of those like me," Jamal shared after his successful surgery.



From Local Beginnings to Global Success: The Story of Maxonal Cosmetics and Taher Al-Haj Mohammed

Taher Al-Haj Mohammed, originally from Aleppo, Syria, worked in cosmetics and essential oils before the Syrian crisis forced him to seek new opportunities in Turkey. In 2018, he moved to Turkey and licensed his company, Maxonal Cosmetics, in 2019.

Navigating a new country's laws and business culture was challenging, but Taher remained determined. He learned about the "Scale Up" project by Qatar Charity, in partnership with the Qatar Fund for Development (QFFD) and SPARK organization, aimed at expanding small and medium-sized enterprises in Turkey.

Accepted as one of the 200 participating companies, Taher underwent three months of intensive training in financial management, risk management, product marketing, and brand management. The project provided essential guidance and support, with trainers visiting his workplace to help overcome obstacles and enhance his digital systems.

Taher also participated in a business forum organized by Qatar Charity, where he networked with companies and investors, securing several agreements and gaining valuable knowledge.

Thanks to the "Scale Up" project, Maxonal Cosmetics expanded within Turkey and began exporting to Australia, England, Germany, and Egypt. The company's success story continues as it aims for further growth and development.









PARTNERSHIPS

Two Agreements with OCHA to Serve Displaced Yemenis

Qatar Charity in Yemen signed two partnership agreements with the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) and START FUND to implement three projects in the sectors of health and water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH), at a total cost of \$2.78 million. The projects are expected to benefit more than 177,000 people.



Agreement with IOM to Support Yemen's Most Vulnerable Communities

Qatar Charity signed an agreement with the International Organization for Migration (IOM) to provide immediate livelihood assistance to vulnerable households to meet urgent needs. In the framework of the Agreement, Qatar Charity will allocate \$500,000 to IOM to improve access to basic goods and services and support long-term livelihood opportunities for over 10,000 people in need.



Letter of Intent with King's College London to Support the Health Sector in Somaliland

Qatar Charity and King's College London signed a Letter of Intent to work together to address global challenges, starting with a project to deliver health improvements across the six regional hospitals in Somaliland, which serve over 45,000 patients each year. The collaboration also includes working with universities in Somaliland to deliver improvements to higher education doctors before entering the health system.

Qatar Charity Signed a Letter of Intent with OCHA to Ensure Reliable Humanitarian Assistance to Sudden and Neglected Crises

Qatar Charity signed a letter of intent with the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) to support the work of OCHA and the Central Emergency Response Fund. The aim is to ensure the provision of reliable humanitarian assistance in sudden and neglected crises around the world.

Agreement with Qatar Fund for Development to Support Sudanese Refugees and IDPs

Qatar Charity signed an agreement with the Qatar Fund for Development (QFFD) to provide food baskets to families affected by the war and displacement crisis in the Republic of Sudan, valued at \$5.5 million.

Agreement with the International Rescue Committee (IRC) to Support Humanitarian Efforts in Sudan

Qatar Charity signed a cooperation agreement with the International Rescue Committee (IRC) for the integrated humanitarian response of displaced populations affected by the war in the Blue Nile State of Sudan.

Agreements Between UNHCR and Qatar Charity to Support Sudanese Refugees in Egypt and Chad and Other Humanitarian Response Projects in Lebanon, Yemen, Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Kenya, and Libya

Qatar Charity and UNHCR have signed eight project agreements with a total funding of \$8.7 million. Two agreements amounting to \$1.2 million to support more than 30,000 Sudanese refugees in Egypt and Chad through Zakat funds. With this contribution, UNHCR will provide cash assistance, WASH health facilities, and core relief items to 22,341 Sudanese refugees in Egypt to enable them to secure their most urgent needs such as rent, food, and healthcare. In addition, 7,790 Sudanese refugees in Chad will be provided with essential relief items, such as blankets, kitchen sets, sleeping mats, and jerrycans.

Six Project Agreements with UNICEF and WFP in Pakistan

Qatar Charity's Pakistan office signed six project agreements with UNICEF and WFP with a total funding of USD 3.2 million. The projects aim to focus on WASH and nutrition sectors in the different provinces of Pakistan. The total number of beneficiaries for these projects is more than one million persons.

Qatar Charity Signed a Project Agreement with ICRC for Support to Sudanese Refugees in Egypt

In this project, Qatar Charity supported Sudanese refugees in Egypt through multi-purpose cash assistance to 2,500 households to cover their most urgent needs between September and December 2023

Four Agreements with START FUND in Nepal, Yemen and Somalia

In total, Qatar Charity signed four project agreements with START Fund for Yemen, Nepal, and Somalia with a total funding of USD 0.5 Million. These projects mainly focused on Cholera response, flooding, and anticipatory heatwave action in Nepal, Yemen, and Somalia.

Agreement with UNHCR to Support Refugees in Dadaab Camp, Kenya

In Kenya, the Qatar Charity office signed a project agreement with UNHCR, allocating USD 100,000 to aid refugees in Dadaab refugee camp. This support encompasses the construction of 500 household latrines, the establishment of a safe space for women and girls, the distribution of menstrual hygiene kits to 250 women and girls, as well as livelihood training, and the provision of startup kit for 30 women participating in the tie and dye program.

One Project Agreement with UNICEF to Support Somalia

In Somalia, Qatar Charity signed one project agreement with UNICEF with a total funding of USD 318,249 from UNICEF.
